## TRANS EUROPEAN EXPRESS (TEE) TRAIN

GERMANY - One stamp from a set of 4 semi-postal stamps with proceeds going to maintain the railroad system.
$\# € 0.55+0.25-$ TEE train crossing a steel bridge as seen from the front right of the engine.

\# Date of Issue: October 5, 2006. Designers: Stefan Klein \& Olaf Neumann from a photo by Carl Bellingrodt. Printing: Multicolored, offset, on white, fluorescent postal paper, DP2, by the German State Printing Works. Size: $55 \times 32.80 \mathrm{~mm}$. Other items: None given but the usual array of philatelic products can be anticipated for this new issue.


## STAMPA 2006

IRELAND - Ireland's 2006 national stamp show was called STAMPA. It was held in Dublin October 13-15, 2006. One souvenir included the Europa stamps shown here.

EUROPA 2006, KOSOVO DATA -
What follows is from correspondent Max Molenaar. "Dear Steve, in your number 375, I read a passage on Kosovo stamps 2006 (page 11). I herby inform you that the stamps mentioned, are real issues of Kosovo. Here is the administrations information on those:

AUSTRIA - Black proof. As you might know, Austria issues a black proof for all new issues. These are attached to publicity information about the stamp. Shown below is the black proof of Austria's 2006 Europa stamp.


No other information is available.

## EUROPA BRIEFS

GERMANY SPECIMEN OVERPRINTS - Figure 1 shows several sets of German Europa stamps all with the "muster" (specimen) overprint. They were seen on Ebay with opening bids of \$9.70-\$13.50.

DIRECT ELECTIONS TO THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT- We have correspondent Oege Weijs to thank for some additional information regarding the Cinderella stamp (label) at figure 2 in the next column. He writes that the label was produced to commemorated the first direct elections to the European Parliament which were held in 1979. Apparently, a person named Volker Heydt had proposed to the Parliament that the member countries issue a common stamp to mark the occasion of the election. The idea was not approved. At the time, Mr. Heydt was working at the Gustav Stresemann Institute in Bergisch Gladbach. He took it upon himself, at his own expense, to produce the labels.

The label was of course an unofficial issue and it did not have any postal validity. Mr. Weijs also provided the photocopy of the label used o cover. Note that valid postage was required to carry the cover in addition to the label which was canceled.

## EUROPA 1960, GREAT BRITAIN -

At first glance, I thought that the item at figure 3 was a signed "proof" of the $6 p$ value of Great Britain's 1960 Europa set. On closer inspection and a careful reading of the Ebay description, such is not the case. Someone had taken a mint copy of the stamp, as issued, and placed it in a black mount. The mount was then affixed to a piece of paper with rounded corners. The stamp artist then signed the paper. Not worth much!

ECONOMIC COOPERATION ADMINISTRATION - The Economic Cooperation Administration was the U.S. government's organization that was responsible for administering help to Europe under the Marshall Plan following World War Two. The first administrator was Paul G. Hoffman. An original "thank-you" letter signed by him is at figure 4. It was described on Ebay as ... "Paul G. Hoffman (1891-1974) was an American business leader, political advisor; president of Studebaker auto company from 1935-1948; his appointment as administrator of the Economic Cooperation Administration was crucial in the Marshall Plan. The European Recovery Program after WWII. This is a typed letter signed from Hoffman to Robert Gros, Public Relations Vice President of Pacific Gas and Electric; friendly content, dated October 18, 1948 Dear Mr. Gros; I am here in Washington for just a few hours between trips to Europe but did want to get off this brief note to you to tell you how much I appreciate the good work you are doing for ECA. Sincerely yours, Paul Hoffman. 1 page approx. ( $8 \times 101 / 2$ ), comes on Economic Cooperation Administration letterhead some light soiling, otherwise, very good condition, $\$ 17.50$ " The letter did not sell.

EUROPA 1956, USED YEAR SET Figure 5 is a complete year set of the 13 Europa stamps issued in 1956. It is in used condition. The year set was offered, mounted on an album page, as shown, with an opening bid of $\$ 10.28$. This shows a great disparity as a M-NH set can sell in excess of $\$ 500$.

EUROPA 1957, FRENCH PROOF The item at figure 6 is a proof of one of the values of France's 1957 Europa stamps. Note that the proof was struck prior to the engraving of the value. It is signed by French master engraver Decaris. It sold for $\$ 102.50$.

EUROPEAN UNION BOOKSHOP -
Mr. Oege Weijs sent along the post card at figure 7, advertising the European Union's Book Shop. It can be accessed at bookshop.eu.int. Have a look.

SMILERS, EUROPA STAMPS - The sheet at figure 8 appears to show all of Great Britain's Europa stamps in a border around Europa stamp designs with interspersed labels showing a stylized British flag. I have no idea what the item is. It was seen on Ebay several times, with an opening bid of about $\$ 28.36$. So, what is a "smiler?"

NATO, US \#1008 PRECANCELS The lot of 15 precancels of U.S. \#1008 the $3 \phi 1952$ NATO stamp at figure 9 was offered on Ebay with an opening bid of $\$ 1.00$.

MISSION MÉTÉO PERMANENTE à I'ILE EUROPA - The cover at figure 10 bears a double circle cachet indicating that it was sent by the MISSION MÉTÉO PERMANENTE à l'ILE EUROPA. I determined from the cover that it was sent by a person assigned to that organization, stationed on the Island of Europa, near Madagascar. There, the French apparently maintained a meteorological site. According to the Ebay seller, this cover is a Europa "precursor" which it is not in my opinion. But it is still an interesting item.

SPECIMEN OVERPRINTS, HUNGARY EUROPA STAMPS - The stamps at figure 11 were called "specimen overprints" by their Ebay seller. The term is used loosely to describe a stamp that has been overprinted (defaced) by the issuing country before distribution. In the case of Hungary, a circle is overprinted on new issues before they are sent to the media for possible use in articles, thus giving the stamp additional publicity.

EUROPA 2000, GERMANY IMPER-
FORATE - The German 2000 Europa stamp comes in several forms including as indicia on a postal stationery envelope. However, the item at figure 12 is different. It is a true imperforate stamp from the top part of a sheet. The Ebay seller provided a certificate of authenticity with the stamp which eventually sold for \$205.27.

EUROPA 1959, BELGIUM COVER The Belgian Philatelic Bureau fills stamp orders in official envelopes, often registered, and franked with current stamps. Such is the case with the cover at figure 13 in the next column. It is franked with three complete sets of Belgium's 1959 Europa stamps. An additional $9 \propto$ postage made up the correct rate of 1.35 for a registered air mail letter to the United States.

PACKET STAMPS - A person can purchase "stamps" in Germany that will be used to mail packages of higher weight. Three examples of the stamps are shown at figure 14 . The vertical booklet contains stamps to be used on packages up to 5 kilos. The horizontal booklet contains stamps that are used for packets up to 10 and 20 kilos. Packages thus franked, will be carried by DHL the international package carrier.

WERTMARKEN (SPECIAL
STAMP) - Figure 15 is a special label from Germany. It depicts a map of Europe. It has value but I do not know how much. It is to be used on packages that are to be sent via air mail anywhere in Europe. It also contains a customs form, and places for the sender and recipient addresses.

EUROPA 1959, ITALY TO NOR-
WAY COVER - Figure 16 is a cover franked with 2 Italian 60L 1959 Europa stamps. They pay the air mail rate from Italy to Norway. An interesting cover showing Europa stamps doing the duty for which they were made.

ERP POSTER DESIGN POSTAL CARD - The Austrian postal card at figure 17 on the next page is based on the winning design by Reyn Dirksen in an ERP-sponsored poster art contest. Remainders of the cards were sold to several airlines

who used them for various promotional events. This card was used by Pan American airways to promote a polar flight from Europe to the United States.

EISENHOWER, CACHET ON U.S. 3¢ NATO FDC - Figure 18 is a cachet in red, white and blue, depicting the likeness of General (later President) Dwight D. Eisenhower, the first Supreme Allied Commander in Europe (SACEUR). The creater of the cachet is unknown and it is not listed in the Mellone catalogue. The cachet is on a first day cover of the United States' $3 \phi$ NATO stamp issued on April 4, 1952, NATO's 3rd anniversary. The cover, from McCusker sale number 227, eventually sold for $\$ 140$ against a preauction estimate of $\$ 20$.

EUROPA 1956, NICE COVER - Many of you have previously read in the Europa News, that I like to see Europa stamps franking covers and thus doing what they were printed for, "moving the mail." Figure 19 is such an example. This is a single weight letter, within France, being carried for the then current rate of 15 f .

EUROPA 1971, STRIKE MAIL - The cover at figure 20 bears a $21 / 2$ p Jersey stamp. It could not be carried due to the British mail strike of 1971. For a payment of 20p, signified by the label (in green) at the lower left of the cover, it was carried by a private, licensed, postal service as evidenced by the etiquette at the lower right (in purple). Figure 21 is a catalogue (Yvert?) listing of the label.

## EUROPA 1960, LIECHTENSTEIN -

Even though Liechtenstein was not a CEPT member at the time, the country issued a "Europa" stamp in 1960. The issue was very popular and the price of a single stamp and a full sheet of 20 rose dramatically. The stamp became one of the "keys" to collecting Europa stamps. I have not seen the stamp on a maximum card before. Here is one at figure 22. It was offered on Ebay with an opening bid of $\$ 1.27$. It sold for $\$ 39.38$.

## BELGIUM POSTAL STATIONERY

- Belgium Post has issued two pre-paid envelopes with Europa-related indicia. One envelope is plain while the other is window-fronted. They sell for $€ 0.70$ each and each can carry a first class letter in Belgium. See figure 23.

EUROPEAN SPACE AGENCY - The cover at figure 26 bears both a special cancel and a cachet commemorating the launch of the European Space agency's "Ariane" rocket on December 24, 1979.

CHURCHILL - A canceled set of 10 carriage labels from the Calf of Man is shown at figure 27. The labels in the upper row were printed in red and the labels in the bottom row were printed in blue. Winston Churchill is depicted.

EUROPA 1974, FRENCH COLLECTIVE SHEET - The item at figure 28 in the next column is a collective sheet from France. These sheets have been issued for many years. What makes them interesting is that they contain an imprint of the stamps in a color other than the issued color. The issued stamps with a first day cancel can be seen to the left. This is yet another way to enjoy collecting Europa stamps.

EUROPA 1959, PROOFS - Figure 29 is a set of sunk, deluxe sheets in the issued colors. According to the Ebay seller, they have minor imperfections. The deluxe sheets did not sell.

The set of 1988 imperforate French Europa stamps at figure 30, was offered on Ebay for a "buy-it-now" price of $\$ 35.75$.

NATO POSTAL STATIONERY - The following is from Treasurer Dana Roper - "I noticed one other item that may provoke comment. On page 17 of the last issue you show an item of Romanian postal stationery for a NATO conference. It was actually issued in 2006, not 1966 as your caption states. I bought a mint copy from the Romanian post office booth at Washington 2006." Figure 31 is the piece of postal stationery with the correct caption.

## 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF EUROPA

STAMPS - This also from Dana Roper. "You may get a few comments concerning my list of Europa $50^{\text {th }}$ anniversary issues. The inclusion of (the) United States was simply a placeholder for the ESU souvenir sheet. Certainly a desirable item (and surely destined for greatness) but not a product of the USPS." Dana refers to the Unit souvenir sheet produced for "EUROPEX" at Washington 2006. The souvenir sheets are still available for $\$ 3$ each plus a SASE, from Don Smith whose address appears elsewhere in this issue.
EUROPA 2005, WHERE ARE THEY
FROM? - This item appeared on page 12 of the last issue of the Europa News. "The two stamps were listed as coming from Moldova. They are not! So where
are they from?" It elicited a reply from Dana Roper.

Directly above is the illustration and caption as they appeared in the last issue. "Re. your question on page 12 ("Where are they from?") they are supposed to be from Transnistria (look carefully at the selvage on the bottom of the block in the last issue. You'll see the ĐİÑ which identifies it)." Dana also wrote that "...It looks like we're starting to see the ubiquitous labels from the breakaway Russian republics showing up as Europas. Abkhazia is another prodigious label producer. NGORNO-KARABAKH (on page 5 ) is a new one on me, but is in the same category. I warned about these in my earlier article on Cinderellas - they are all produced by a Lithuanian printer who apparently can't churn them out fast enough. A dealer at Washington 2006 had boxes of them - showing everything from Concorde to kittens - that he was selling at 3 for $\$ 10$. Caveat Emptor. In the next column is a partial list of these tiny Russian republics. Two of them (Fr. Joseph Earth and Novosibirsk) are islands under ice in the Arctic Ocean:
(Just to re-iterate the Unit policy...we never tell any of our members what or what not to collect. Each of us is free to collect as we see fit, so if these items are your cup of tea, we are glad to present them here in the pages of the Europa News for your information.

COUNCIL OF EUROPE, 105 PROOF - Figure 34 is a sunk, artist's die proof in black, of France official stamp number Scott 105, issued for the Council of Europe, signed by Decaris the engraver. The item was seen on Ebay with a "buy-it-now" price of only $\$ 59.50$. Considering that only about 28 of this type of proof in this color was produced, and given the popularity of the "Europa" stamps, I believe that this price is very, very good for such a scarce item.

EUROPA 1964, MONACO IMPERF -
The stamps at figure 37 are the complete set of two, of Monaco's 1964 Europa stamps. They are in imperforate condition. Seen on Ebay, the seller asked for an opening bid of $\$ 25.65$. The set sold for that price.

EUROPA 1966, ITALY VARIETY -
According to an Ebay seller, the block of four 1966 Italian Europa stamps at figure 38, shows a variety in the left selvedge. Note both the wavy lines in the bottom selvedge, but also the wavy and vertical lines close to the left edge of the sheet. If a variety at all, it is a minor one and is produced by a slight mis-registration of the paper during the printing process. Does anyone have more information on this "variety?"

figure 42 was sent from England to Wilmington, Delaware. At the lower left corner is a manuscript notation ' by Mail Steamer/Europa." Barely relevant to European unity but a nice philatelic item. MARSHALL PLAN TRAIN - Below

and in the next column at figure 43 are three sets of German semi-postal stamps affixed to cards, all canceled on November 21, 1950 in the town of Hamm, Westphalia. Hamm was the 36th stop on the first voyage of the Marshall Plan Train through Germany following WWII. The special cancel was applied on the 15 th and last car in the train. Of additional interest is the value of the stamps used on the cards. The Ebgay seller was asking for opening bids of only $€ 1$ for each of the three cards.

ING SHIFT - The stamp at figure 44 is Scott number 3141. It was issued to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Marshall Plan. Note that the words "European Recovery Program" are shifted downward a complete line so that the second word "Program" is over the inscription "The Marshall Plan."

## EUROPA 1960, GREECE VARIETY

- The stamp at figure 45 is Greece's 1960 Europa issue. Note that there is a line under the first " $\Lambda$ " in the word "Hellas." It should be noted that while interesting, other varieties exist. They are an inverted watermark, a white dot to the right of the letter " R " of Europa; and, a double impression. This stamp was seen on Ebay with a starting bid of $\$ 10$.

EUROPA 1960, IRISH FIRST DAY COVER - The cover at figure 46 is an unofficial first day cover of Ireland's 1960 Europa set. The set alone has gone way up in value making this cover of some interest. It is franked with both values of the set making the cover overfranked. The Ebay seller was asking for an opening bid of about $\$ 37.89$.

LIONS MEETING, 1978 - The numbered card at figure 47 in the next column is a souvenir from ther 1978 Lions meeting that took place in Gubbio, Italy on april 23 rd of that year. The theme of the meeting as indicated on the card was, "The Lions and European Unity." The revers of the card, also at figure 47 shows a stamp with the meeting's souvenir cancel and a picture. I cannot identify the picture, but with the

surrounding information, it could be a likeness of the Goddess Europa. Can anyone identify the picture? Who is it?

EUROPA 1957, GERMAN REGISTERED COVER - As you know, I always look for Europa stamps on commercial covers. I like to see the stamps actually doing what they were produced for...moving the mail. The registered cover at figure 48 is such an example. It is franked with both values of Germany's 1957 Europa stamps ( $3 \times 10 \& 1$ $\mathrm{x} 40=70 \mathrm{pf}$ ). I can't tell if there is a back stamp on the cover, but it is a nice example of the use of Europa stamps.

## EUROPA 1956, ITALY ON COVER -

Forgive me, but figure 49 in the next column is another example of a good use of a Europa stamp. This time, it is a single use of the high value of Italy's 1956 Europa set. It is on a registered cover, with a printed "registered with return receipt." I do not know the
meaning of the boxed (A.H.) etiquette. The cover was sent from the Napoli 3 (Naples) post office to a Naples address.

EUROPA 1961, ITALY ON COVER -
Forgive me again, but figure 50 is yet another example of a good use of a Europa stamp. This time, a registered cover is franked with 3 copies of the L. 30 value of Italy's 1961 Europa set. The cover is similar to the one at figure 49 but has a slightly different pre-printed configuration. I always added covers to my collection as I wanted to continue collecting Europa stamps, and needed to be able to hunt for more items after I got all of the stamps. Good covers was one way of doing it.

NATO LETTER - While a bit hard to see in its reduced size, the item at figure 51 is a label that was apparently affixed to either a NATO newsletter or other type of paper (e.g., printed matter). It carries 3.5 d in meter postage from England and likely was mailed in the early 1960s. Any additional information will be appreciated.

NATO, PORTUGAL 1952 FDC - The cover at figure 52 is a registered, back stamped first day cover of Portugal's 3rd anniversary commemoration of NATO set. It was offered on Ebay with an opening bid of only $\$ 9.99$ which I think is quite low for such a good item

## GOODYEAR BLIMP "EUROPA" -

Figure 53 is a souvenir cover that was flown on September 7, 1974 aboard the Goodyear Blimp "Europa. This flight went between Vienna and Salzburg." In addition to the two hand stamps and the cachet, the "airmail" cover also bears a Salzburg circular date stamp and a Vienna cancellation on the stamp. That cancellation commemorates the flight.

CHANNEL ISLANDS MAIL - The postcard at figure 54 in the next column is franked twice. To the left is a Herm Island carriage label. It is franked at 8 p and bears a Herm Island cancel. However, in order to have the card carried to

Guernsey where it is addressed, it had to be franked with a Great Britain stamp of 3 p in order to get off Herm Island, travel through the G.B. post and to be delivered to an address on Guernsey. However, this is an interesting item as virtually all mail from Herm is philatelically inspired while this piece is obviously personal.

## EUROPA 2005, MADEIRA BOOK-

LET - The item at figure 55 is a booklet of Europa stamps issued by Portuguese Madeira in 2005. The Ebay seller indicated that only 10,000 booklets were produced and each one contains a "color proof." He also wrote that the booklets are sold out at the Madeira post office. An opening bid of $\$ 24$ was asked for.

SHAUBEK ALBUM - Figure 56 is the cover of a Shaubek Europa album. A two volume set of the album was offered on Ebay with an opening bid of $\$ 1.27$.

EUROPA 2006, SLOVENIA COLOR "PROOFS" - According to its Ebay seller, the item at figure 57 is an officially numbered souvenir sheet in test colors of Slovenia's 2006 Europa stamp. The seller was asking for an opening bid of \$9.99.

EUROPA 1960, DESIGN ON A "FREE RUSSIA" SHEET - The sheet of two "stamps in red at figure 58, draws heavily on the common design of 1960 Europa stamps. It has no postal validity and was privately prepared. Slogans reading "Freedom for Russia" and "Freedom for Entire Europe" are also on the sheet. The sheet was issued without gum. I do not know what group might have prepared the sheet. Does anyone have more information about this item?

EUROPAFRIQUE 1977-The item at figure 59 is an imperforate pair of Mali's 1977 Europafrique issue. It was seen on Ebay with an opening bid of $\$ 15.33$.

ESSEN 1978, HUNGARY SHEET The numbered sheet at figure 60 incorporates a Hungarian "Europa" stamp, a map of Europe and an inscription. I believe it was privately produced for the stamp show that took place in Essen, Germany November 1-5, 1978.

EUROPA 1997, HUNGARY SPECIMENS - Note that the stamps at figure 61 bear a circular "cancel." That circle mark is used by the Hungarian post to "cancel" stamps sent to various organizations as specimens. The specimens are to be used for publicity purposes. The circle identifies the stamp as a "specimen" and it is not a postal marking used to move mail.

## THURN \& TAXIS, GUYANA SHEET

- The souvenir sheet at figure 62 in the next column was issued by Guyana. It covers the 1992 Olympics held in Barcelona; the 150th anniversary of Great Britain's "penny black stamp; the 500th anniversary of the Thurn \& Taxis postal service; It bears a " $\$ 500$ " overprint and, another commemorating the World Columbian Stamp Expo held in Chicago, May 22-31, 1992. While not my cup of tea, the souvenir sheet will be of interest to people who collect Thurn \& Taxis as the first European postal system.

EUROPA 1992, SWEDEN FOLDER Among the items issued by Sweden for her 1992 Europa stamps was a folder containing a complete set of stamps, a steel plate proof and a four-color proof. Multiple copies of the folder were offered on Ebay with an opening bid of $\$ 9.99$. See figure 63.

## EUROPA 1996, VATICAN CITY IM-

PERFORATE - Figure 64 is the 1996 Europa stamp issued in 1996 by the Vatican City. It depicts Edith Stein. Note that this stamp exists in imperforate condition. A copy was offered on Ebay with an opening bid of about $\$ 1.25$. It sold for $\$ 25.86$.

NATO, SPECIAL DELIVERY COVER - The cover at figure 64a was sent from one address in New York City to another by special delivery. At the time the letter was mailed, the correct postage rate was $3 \phi$ for the letter and $15 \phi$ for the special delivery. Note that the cover bears two stamps, one of them the 1952 NATO stamp, making up the correct rate.

 In 1993, Albania released a sheet of one stamp depicting art. The word "Europa" in the PostEurop logo style appeared on the sheet. The one shown here at figure 65 was seen on Ebay with an opening bid of $\$ 1$.

EUROPA 1984, FRENCH POSTAL CARD - In addition to its set of 2 stamps, France issued the postal card at figure 66 on the next page in 1984 as a part of its annual Europa emission. The indicia on the postal card is the 2.20 franc high value from the Europa set. It is in the same color as the stamp. This postal card is listed in the Domfil Catalogue of Europa stamps. While not particularly valuable, the postal card makes a nice addition to the stamps.

EUROPA 1958, COMPOUND PROOF - The item at figure 67 is an imperforate, compound, sunk proof, in the issued colors, of France's 1958 Europa stamps. It was offered on Ebay with an opening bid of $€ 1$. According to the Ebay seller, the proof is listed in a catalogue at $€ 400$. The proof sold for $\$ 39.73$. I think this is a good price.

GREEK ISLANDS, EUROPA LABELS - The labels seen here at figure 68 in the next column, have been shown in the Europa News before. They are usually seen on "First day covers." They do not have any postal validity. However, they were offered for sale in an auction and the catalogue write up gave some additional information which is reported here. The lot was listed as being "London printed, in 1960. Seen are the labels in both perforated and imperforate condition. They are in blocks of 6 . Three islands make a "set." They are Arcoudi, Oxia and Dragonera. Each set consists of 2 labels, 4 and 8 drachmas. The colors of each label are different as shown in the following table, but the colors are the same regardless of whether or not they are perforated or imperforate.

In any event, someone put the sheet together to commemorate the first direct elections to the European Parliament in 1979.

PHILATELIC EXHIBITION, EXPHISALM '58 - In 1958 the Salm Philatelic Club of Vielsalm, Belgium, held an exhibition under the "patronage" of the Council of Europe. The exhibition used a special cancel featuring the European "E" flag. The official cachet for the flag depicted one value of Belgium's 1957 Europa stamp set. An official cover is at figure 72.

WINE FESTIVAL - The 1963 Zell "Black Cat" Wine Festival also recognized international friendship between European cities. I am constantly amazed at the connection to the theme of European unity that are found With a bit of digging. Unless one sees the "fine print" or the small European flag, it is possible that a cover like this could be easily passed over.

Rules and Regulations Governing Exhibits
The American Topical Association (ATA) defines a Topical/Thematic collection as one that consists of stamps and/or other material chosen for their design, rather than for the countries that issue them or the class of postal service they provide. A thematic or thematic display exhibit is a topical exhibit arranged to tell a story.

1. This exhibition is open to all collectors regardless of society affiliation provided the entry meets the definition of topical/thematic exhibits. Exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor, and the preparation of the exhibit must represent the owners's efforts. The Exhibition Committee reserves the right to limit or reject any exhibit at its discretion without giving any reason. In such cases, a refund of the entry fee will be made. Each exhibitor will be notified of its acceptance or rejection in not less than 30 days after the receipt of the complete application with required attachments and full payment.
2. All entries must be submitted on this official entry form (photocopies are acceptable). The entry form must include the exhibitor's name (a nom de plume may be used), the exhibit title, and a brief description of the exhibit for the official program. Each entry must be accompanied by the appropriate frame fee (see options on Official Entry Form) and a copy of the title page, plan page, and a synopsis (optional). Applications will be considered on a first-come first-served basis, and must be received no later than April 16,2007 , or until such time as all frames have been fully subscribed. Failure to exhibit after an exhibit has been accepted forfeits the entry subs
3. Thematic Multi-frame Class and Thematic Display Class exhibits are limited to a minimum of two frames and a maximum of ten frames. Thematic One-Frame exhibits and Thematic Youth exhibits of one to five frames are also welcome. Use one entry form for each exhibit.
4. Thematic Display Class exhibits to be considered must meet the following criteria: If the non-philatelic material is removed, the philatelic material that remains must be thematically arranged with appropriate text like exhibits in the Thematic Multi-frame class.
5. Frames will hold 16 individual $8.5^{\prime \prime} \times 11$ " (or European A4) pages. Each page must be enclosed in a sheet protector and must be identified on the reverse side of the page with the owner's name and a clear indication of mounting sequence. Exhibits should not show on their face any identifying marks of ownership aside from names on the covers.
6. There will be a panel of five judges, three of whom shall be APS-ATA accred-

Dismounting will begin at 4:00 p.m., Sunday, June 17, 2007, and no early dismounting will be permitted from any reason.
10. Each exhibitor should arrange for insurance for the period of time that the exhibit is in transit, in storage prior to and following the exhibition, and while on display. Every precaution will be taken to safeguard all exhibits, including the provision of 24 -hour security personnel. ## FEATURE ARTICLE - "THAT FAR EMOTION" <br> Michele Picardi

On September 15, 1956, Italy issued two stamps with a common design on the theme of "Europa." That issue was the first of a series of more than one hundred Italian values that over the next 50 years have repeated the name Europa with various designs since those of the 1956 stamps. In addition to Italy, five other countries also issued stamps in 1956. Those countries were Belgium, France, Germany, Luxembourg and the Netherlands. Each country issued a set of two stamps except Luxembourg which issued a set of three stamps. The nice thing about the first "Europa" issue is that all of the countries issued stamps with a common design. From that point forward, the word "Europa" (on stamps) had been born. It has lasted to this day. In July 1955 a conference was convened in Messina to consider the major issues involved in European Unity. One item looked at was postal cooperation and unification. A recommendation of the Conference was that there should be an issue of stamps from participating countries on a single subject, with a common design, on the theme of "European Unity." After working through various bureaucracies an stamp design contest was launched in early 1956. The purpose of the contest was to create the basic design the first "Europa" stamps. The contest attracted artists from many countries. At a meeting held in Paris on March 20, 1956, a design submitted by the artist Daniel Gonzague of France was chosen as the contest winner. The design featured the "E" flag of the European Federalist Movement and a scaffold with the word "EUROPA,"


5 participating counties issued stamps in 2 -value sets and in quantities commensurate with then contemporaneous needs. Luxembourg chose to issue a set of 3 common design stamps in a limited
quantity. The following table shows the production quantities.

Luxembourg issued 425,000 complete sets of three values.

The number and variety of items that might have been made during the production of the first Europa stamps is not known. However, it is certain that some special proofs were made from the French dies. Some of those are illustrated here. Of particular interest is one strike of the 15 franc value made in both the positive and negative images. It is signed at the bottom by Jules Piel, the master engraver responsible for executing Gonzague's design for the French State Printing Works. Gonzague had written about the "...emotion with which the first Europa stamps were received as they were a first tangible sign of the great desire for peace living inside me...".

Mr. Picardi wrote that he was amazed that when he attended the 1st European Community Postal Mechanization Conference at the Palace in EUR, he had been surprised that an envelope containing all 13 values of the 1956 Europa stamps was on sale for 480 Lire. (I cannot make the conversion in today's currency, but it was quite inexpensive, ed.).

There are many reasons why collectors of Europa stamps should be grateful to the first 13 stamps on the occasion of their 50th anniversary.


Above are illustrations scanned from the original article. These items of the French Europa stamps are quite rare and seldom seen. From the top, they are a deluxe sheet of the 30 franc value (showing the security punches applied at the print works); an imperforate compound deluxe sheet bearing both values of the French 1956 Europa set; a perforated compound deluxe sheet bearing both values of the French 1956 Europa set. These three items are all in the issued color.

Finally, there is the positive and negative images of the 15 franc value as described in the article. This is the first time that I have every heard about or seen this item.

# THE PHILATELIC LEGACY OF THE MARSHALL PLAN AS RECORDED BY THE D'URSO SPECIALIZED CATALOGUE OF STAMPS AND POSTMARKS REFERRING TO EUROPEAN INTEGRATION ${ }^{1}$ 

## Stephen Luster

Europe was in a shambles following World War Two (WWII). Allies and foes alike had suffered. People in many countries were in great need and cities and their infrastructures had to be rebuilt. While countries tried to help themselves immediately following the end of hostilities, it became apparent that additional external support would be needed if they were to recover in a reasonable time.

This article takes a philatelic look at post-WWII European recovery under the United States Economic Cooperation Act (ECA) which was popularly known as the European Recovery Program (ERP) or the Marshall Plan. It does so by examining events leading up to the enactment of the ECA in 1948; and by exploring the philatelic legacy of the Marshall Plan from 1948 to 1967, as recorded in the D'Urso Specialized Catalogue.

While researching and writing this article, I realized that if treated thematically, I could write and illustrate a book on the subject of post-WWII European reconstruction. However, in order to keep it at article length, I decided, save for a short introduction and some amplifying illustrations, to limit it for the most part, to the philately recorded in the ERP section of the D'Urso Catalogue. ${ }^{1}$ In that way, the article became self-limiting and of manageable length.

Because the article is limited, many rehabilitation and reconstruction efforts of groups such as the American Friends Committee, The American Joint Distribution Committee, CRALOG, operated by the Mennonite Central Committee, the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration (UNRRA), the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) and the Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe (CARE) program, all of which have associated philately, are not covered. Perhaps one day, I will examine each of them in greater detail, but for now let's
take a look at reconstruction in postWWII Europe.

BACKGROUND - In 1947, following earlier less formal efforts, and the realization that Europe could not rebuild alone, the United States government under then President Harry S Truman (figure 1) decided to provide assistance to as many European countries as would accept it. In helping to rebuild allies and enemies alike, the United States and the west showed how much they had learned from
 the harsh terms and aftermath of the Versailles Treaty which ended World War One. In addition, the United States wanted to show the world, and Europe in particular, that aligning with the west was preferable to aligning with the communist dominated east. The "architect" of the west's assistance to post-WWII Europe was the then United Fig. 2-Marshall. States Secretary of State, and former Chief of Staff of the United States Army during the Second World War, General George C. Marshall (figure 2).

MARSHALL - "George Catlett Marshall was born on December 31, 1880, in Uniontown, Pennsylvania. He graduated from the Virginia Military Institute in 1901 and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army. He rose through the ranks, and was promoted to Army Chief of Staff with the rank of General (four stars) on September 1, 1939. He was made a General of the Army (five stars) on December 16, 1944. He held positions of great responsibility following the Second World War. As Secretary of State from 1947 to 1949, he developed an economic program, the Marshall Plan, that turned the
tide of Communism in war-torn Western Europe. He died on October 16, 1959, and is buried in Arlington National Cemetery.," ${ }^{2}$

## EUROPEAN RECONSTRUCTION IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING

WWII - As stated earlier, Europe was in a shambles following the war. Limited as they were, some countries had begun reconstruction following the end of hostilities. For example, Italy floated bonds and used the proceeds to make low-cost reconstruction loans. Inscriptions on 1946 post cards such as those seen at figure 3, exhorted Italians to underwrite those loans.
Italy was also the site of a Reconstruc-

tion Sample Fair, held in Treviso, October 11-13, 1946. A cancel designated in the D'Urso Catalogue as number G0, assigned a rarity factor of 10 , was used all three days of the fair (see figure 4).
Italy also hosted a Reconstruction Fair, in Lucca, November

20—22, 1947. cancel designated in the D'Urso Catalogue as number G0a, with an assigned rarity factor of 8 , was used all three days of that fair (see figure 5).

At about the same time as the Italian

fairs, Germany among many other countries was undertaking a massive cleanup effort. A post card, specially prepared for the Leipzig Industrial Fair of 1947, shows the German cleanup in progress (see figure 6). However, despite


Fig. 6 - Reconstruction post card. those efforts, it became obvious that individual countries could not rebuild either alone or in a timely manner. Additional, external help would be needed.

EVENTS LEADING UP TO THE ENACTMENT OF THE ECAGeorge C. Marshall had outlined a program of economic assistance to a wartorn Europe in a speech he gave at Harvard University on June 5, 1947. In his speech, Marshall said that "...The breakdown of the business structure of Europe during the war was complete. Recovery has been seriously retarded by the fact that two years after the close of hostilities a peace settlement with Germany and Austria has not been agreed upon. But even given a more prompt solution of these difficult problems, the rehabilitation of the economic structure of Europe quite evidently will require a much longer time and greater effort than has been foreseen...

The truth of the matter is that Europe's requirements for the next three or four years of foreign food and other essential products - principally from America are so much greater than her present ability to pay that she must have substantial additional help or face economic, social, and political deterioration of a very grave character. It is logical that the United States should do whatever it is able to do to assist in the return of normal economic health in the world, without which there can be no political stability and no assured peace...

It is already evident that, before the United States Government can proceed much further in its efforts to alleviate the situation and help start the European world on its way to recovery, there must be some agreement among the countries
of Europe as to the requirements of the situation and the part those countries themselves will take in order to give proper effect to whatever action might be undertaken by this Government. It would be neither fitting nor efficacious for this Government to undertake to draw up unilaterally a program designed to place Europe on its feet economically. This is the business of the Europeans... The initiative, I think, must come from Europe. The role of this country should consist of friendly aid in the drafting of a European program and of later support of such a program so far as it may be practical for us to do so. The program should be a joint one, agreed to by a number, if not all, European nations." ${ }^{4}$

Marshall's plan met with general support, but ran into some opposition in the U.S. Congress. It would be about a year after his speech, and only after adverse political events in eastern Europe, that the U.S. Congress was inclined to act by passing the ECA in 1948

## THE COMMITTEE FOR EUROPEAN ECONOMIC COOPERATION

 - However, the intervening time was not wasted. In anticipation of the enactment of the ECA, and because the European countries had been told that the United States would only respond to specific, joint requests for assistance, representatives from 16 European countries gathered in Paris on July 12, 1947. ${ }^{5}$ There they formed the Committee for European Economic Cooperation and began to draw up specific requests for assistance and to form planning groups, hold conferences and create commissions to look at the specific aspects of needed assistance.The early work of two of the Committee's commissions is philatelically recorded. First, the Labor Planning Commission held a preparatory conference on labor participation in Rome, Italy from 26-31 January 1948. Three cancels resulted from that conference. Two circular date stamps, assigned D'Urso Catalogue numbers G1a and G1b, as seen in figures 7 and 8 , and a two-line slogan, number G1c, as seen in figure 9 are known. The differences in the cancels at figures 7 and 8 can be seen in the
size of the letter " M " in the word "MANO," the size of the words "per la" and the way the horizontal line at the top of the bottom semicircle points to the right leg of the letter " R " in the G1a cancel but the left leg of the letter "A" in the G1b cancel in the word "OPERA
The circular date stamps are both assigned D'Urso rarity factors of 10R while the slogan cancel is assigned a rarity factor of 7 .
Second, the Preparatory Commission for

a European Payment System was set up because there was a serious problem in Europe with the awkward method of settling trade balances between countries. This Preparatory Commission developed the framework of a European customs system that facilitated the settlement of trade balances between member countries.

Two cancels were used to commemorate the Preparatory Commission meeting which was held in Rome, Italy from February 25 to March 3, 1948. The circular date stamp is numbered in the D'Urso Catalogue as C24 while a slogan cancel is assigned number C25. They carry rarity factors of 10 R and 8 respectively. A card bearing the conference cancel is also shown. See figures $10-12$. The initials "U.D.E." in the cancels stand for "Union Douanier Européen," later to become the European Monetary Union, an organization analogous to a bank clearing system.

It is unclear as to why the D'Urso Catalogue listed the "U.D.E." cancels in the section on European Political Congresses and Meetings (section C) when the results of the meeting are considered by some people as an early accomplishment of the Marshall Plan as the work was undertaken by a preparatory commission under the Committee for European Economic Cooperation. As such, the cancels could have been listed in the ERP section (G) of the Catalogue .

Eventually, the Committee for European Economic Cooperation established its permanent headquarters in the Palace Muette at rue André-Pascal 2, Paris, France Fig. 13- Muette Palace. (see figure 13).

In 1949 the committee changed its name to the Organization for European Economic Cooperation (OEEC), the institution designated to administer the European side of the Marshall Plan. Also in 1949, the OEEC began using postal meters at its rue Pascal address. From that time until 1961, nine numbered meters were used with a total of 16 varieties. See Table 1 in the next column for the details.

In 1961, the OEEC changed its name to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD/OCDE). The name change was precipitated by a change in the organization's mission following the end of the Marshall Plan. The new organization focused its attention on other economic and development matters in Europe. During the period 1961 to 1970, the OECD/OCDE used 15

numbered and 3 unnumbered meters with a total of 34 varieties. Table 2 provides the details. The D'Urso Catalogue assigned the identification designator of "7MA" to the meter marks of the OEEC and OCDE. Figure 14 is an example of OEEC meter number 7MA3, used in 1952 to frank a new publication announcement (D'Urso rarity factor of 7), while figure 15 is an official cover mailed from the rue Pascal address of the OEEC to Geneva, Switzerland. It bears a 1959 strike, in red, of meter number 7MA13 with a D'Urso rarity factor of 5.

THE FOREIGN ASSISTANCE ACT OF 1948 - Meanwhile, on November 17, 1947 then United States President Harry S Truman (figure 3) had appeared before a joint session of Congress where he outlined the "Marshall Plan." Although generally accepted, his proposal encountered some opposition from conservative congressmen. As a result, there followed a lengthy debate. The Communists used that time to their advantage. In February 1948 they orchestrated a coup in Czechoslovakia. That coup was a "wake-up call' for the U.S. Congress and on April 3, 1948 it passed the Foreign Assistance Act establishing the Economic Cooperation Administration to administer the European Recovery Program, known as the Marshall Plan.

Both Western and Eastern European countries were asked to participate in the European Recovery Program but the eastern European countries declined under intense pressure from Russia. Eventually, 18 Western European countries became a part of the Marshall Plan. ${ }^{6}$ "Marshall's leadership, diplomacy, integrity and vision led the world into an unprecedented era of peace. He was the architect of both the victory and the peace. His personal efforts to extend a helping hand to rebuild a devastated Europe, led to the $\$ 16.2$ billion Economic Recovery Program. His plan changed the course of history. It was the first time in history that the victors rebuilt the vanquished. The Marshall Plan became the foundation for the current unification of the European Union.... ${ }^{2}$
