Aland issues two stamps. The first is the common design which shows a new peace symbol, a metaphor for a peacefully integrated, cooperative society in which people embrace each other's culture. On Europe Day, Åland Post also releases its own design proposal for the competition, created by stamp debuting illustrator Sofia Pusa. A sunrise above the Åland granite cliffs illustrates the peace sign.

Also issued in a booklet of 2 panes of imperforate stamps in blocks of 4, as shown below.

Huba escaped, and rode on horseback to the Danube.



The website referenced in the Bulgaria writeup is "Europe's Not Dead," and is a trove of information about Europe. To summarize from the home page, https://europeisnotdead.com/ intends to "... explore the heritage of the world's smallest conti-



nent."

Reaching back to Bulgaria's Europa issue, "Europe's Not Dead" provides this interesting bit of follow-up:

"The day that Huba and Asparukh were reunited was March 1st, the new year in the tradition of those times. They called the white and red threads of yarn after the name of the month March, and named it 'Martenitsa.'

"The Martenitsa became a symbol of peace and love, health and happiness. The white color symbolizes purity and honesty in relationships, and the red color means life, passion, and cordiality in friendship and mutual love."

"Europe's Not Dead" is just one example of the wealth of information to be found on the internet. I don't know if anyone has done this, but I suspect that if Wikipedia was issued in bound volumes (think Encyclopedia Britannica) it would probably take up an entire house. At a

SVAROG

LADA

Svarog, creator of the universe, is a Slavic god of fire and blacksmithing. He was once interpreted as a sky god on the basis of an etymology rejected by modern scholarship. He is mentioned in only one source, the Primary Chronicle, which is problematic in interpretation. He is presented there as the Slavic equivalent of the Greek god Hephaestus. The meaning of his name is associated with fire.

Lada, Goddess of motherhood, was first mentioned around 1405-1412 in the sermons of Lucas of Wielki Koźmin, which warned against worshipping Lada and other gods during spring ceremonies and folk performances. They owe their popularity to Długosz, who in one of his sources recognized Lada as a goddess and in another as a god of war, the Polish equivalent of the Roman god Mars, to Aleksandr Faminstyn, who recognized the word Lada in Russian songs as the goddess of marriage, and to scholar Boris Rybakov, who insisted on recognizing her historicity. However, the vast majority of religious scholars and Slavists reject the historicity of these deities, believing that they owe their divine status to a misunderstanding of the song refrains by medieval scribes.

EuroMed 2022 MARITIME ARCHEOLOGY OR ANTIQUE CITIES OF THE MEDITERRANEAN

TURKEY 1v Issue date 19 July 2022



The **Uluburun Shipwreck** was discovered by a sponge diver in 1982. Between 1984-1994, more than 22,000 dives were made to depths exceeding 44 meters in underwater excavations that lasted for 11 seasons. The artifacts extracted from the shipwreck are exhibited in Uluburun Hall in the Bodrum Underwater Archaeology Museum.

The remains belong to the late Bronze Age (c. 1600-1200 BC) and this makes the Uluburun Shipwreck the oldest ocean-going vessel in the world. The ship was found lying at a depth of 44 to 52 meters on a steep, rocky slope filled with sand pockets. It is estimated that the ship, which is approximately 15 meters in length and 5 meters in width, carries 20 tons of cargo. 10 tons of copper ingots made in the form of ox hides and 1 ton of tin constituted the main shipload of the ship. The most striking item is the golden scarab belonging to Queen Nefertiti of Egypt.

According to the shipload it carries, the ship's possible route is either from the Syrian-Palestinian coast or from Cyprus to the Aegean. The shipload of the ship containing exotic and valuable gifts exchanged by kings, heads of state, or wealthy merchants has shown that the Uluburun Shipwreck carries an outstanding shipment. According to the dendrochronological method of dating with tree rings, the date of the cedar tree with which the ship was built, the implication is that the Uluburun ship sank between 1335-1305 BC.

Article Prophets of Europa: Germaine de Staël

Anne Louise **Germaine de Staël**-Holstein, commonly known as Madame de Staël, was a French woman of letters and political theorist, the daughter of banker and French finance minister Jacques Necker and Suzanne Curchod, a leading salonnière. She was a voice of moderation in the French Revolution and the Napoleonic era up to the French Restoration. She was present at the Estates General of 1789 and at the 1789 Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen.

Her intellectual collaboration with Benjamin Constant between 1794 and 1810 made them one of the most celebrated intellectual couples of their time. She discovered sooner than others the tyrannical character and designs of Napoleon. For many years she lived as an exile – firstly during the Reign of Terror and later due to personal persecution by Napoleon.

Madame deStaël is listed in our Legacy Handbook as a Prophet of Europa. The entry states simply that she "wrote important books advocating a rapprochement between the nations of Europe in order to avoid wars." Editor Emeritus Col. Steve Luster was especially interested in people who were influential toward the creation of a federalist Europe, and he also felt that deStaël deserved a place in the list of Europa Forerunners. The current auction includes a maximum card featuring the French stamp for Madame de Staël. The stamp shows a portion of a portrait by Francois Gerard. The card shows more of the painting, and was featured in an article by Col. Luster. With no reserve, the card is a bargain.

Europafrique: Europa Industry Cooperation — Dana Roper

Another item in the current auction drew my attention — the cover for the MIFERMA issue of 1962 by Mauritania. I have a similar cover which I obtained as I was building my "Agencies of Europa" section of my collection. Some explanation is in order:

Besides the annual issue, some obvious Europa topics include items spotlighting European agencies and organizations. Besides the obvious (Council of Europe, EEC, etc.) there are commercial and development initiatives.

According to the proposals of the Treaty of Rome, there was formed at the beginning of 1958 an association of the European Economic Community with the Overseas Land and Territories. The first area focused on was the enormous continent to the south and the riches it contained.

The first "Eurafricaine" meeting, with representatives of 16 member states, took place in Rome in January 1961, at the initiative of the European Parliamentary Assembly. That meeting made way for a conference that took place in Strasbourg 19-24 June 1961. Under the name "Conference of the European Parliamentary Assembly with the Parliaments of the African States and Malagasy Associates" the meeting gathered together for the first time delegates from two continents to discuss the ties between

their countries. This and subsequent meetings were publicized by stamp issues from participating African countries. The first was an omnibus issue from eight of the African signatories, dubbed "Europafrique."



One specific initiative was the development of iron ore in Mauritania, made possible through the initial expenditure of over \$150M by the European Coal & Steel Community and the UN World Bank to the Societe Anonyme des Mines de Fer de Mauritanie (MIFERMA), a Mauritanian company.

Shares in MIFERMA were largely held (over 50%) by British, French, German and Italian consumers. The project included the construction of railroads, port facilities, housing and power generation facilities as needed.

To publicize this ambitious undertaking, Mauritania overprinted an airmail definitive stamp with a diagram of the venture:



A second overprint was also produced, with MIFERMA boxed off.





The item being offered is a registered first day cover of the MIFERMA stamp with the original overprint. Made all the more desirable because it obviously made it through the mail and emerged in good shape.

The subject of Europafrique was given extensive coverage in issues EN# 421—EN# 426. The MIFERMA stamps were pictured on page EN# 422-12. ■



Europa on Swiss Postcards — Linn's Stamp News

When the January issue of Linn's Stamp News arrived in my mailbox, I was pleased to see a Europa issue displayed on the cover.

Why Europa?

The stamp indicium shows a Space Shuttle just after launch. The opposite side shows shuttle in orbit with the payload doors open. That's where the Europa tie-in comes. The payload contains **Spacelab**, with the letters "**sea**" prominently (well, sort of) displayed.

Spacelab was a reusable laboratory developed by the European Space Agency (ESA) and used on certain spaceflights flown by the Space Shuttle. The laboratory comprised multiple components, including a pressurized module, an unpressurized carrier, and other related hardware housed in the Shuttle's cargo bay. The components were arranged in various configurations to meet the needs of each spaceflight. Spacelab components flew on a total of about 32 Shuttle missions. NASA describes it thus:

Construction on the Spacelab modules began in 1974 by what was then the company ERNO-VFW-Fokker.

Spacelab is important to all of us for at least four good reasons. It expanded the Shuttle's ability to conduct science on-orbit manyfold. It provided a marvelous opportunity and example of a large international joint venture involving government, industry, and science with our European allies. The European effort provided the free world with a really versatile laboratory system several years before it would have been possible if the United States had had to fund it on its own.



And finally, it provided Europe with the systems development and management experience they needed to move into the exclusive manned space flight arena.

It is assigned number P241 in the Michel catalog.



There's a lot of philatelic material out there for Spacelab and other European Space Agency initiatives. This is a silk edition from cover producer Benham. I purchased it because of the cachet — from Sputnik to Spacelab in 25 years!

This just in. Linn's Stamp News, catalog update edition, plans to revert to being Scott Stamp Monthly. A mock-up of the new cover is on the right. So what changed? Linn's Stamp News will now have only 24 print editions; the rest will be digital. Another sign of the times.

I found Tonny Van Loij's article on Thurn and Taxis interesting, as I also collect Thurn and Taxis — both the T & T stamps themselves, as well as stamps about the postal service.

My introduction to Thurn and Taxis was not philatelic, however. My interest began six years ago when I went to the Christmas market at Emmeram Castle in Regensburg. There I discovered that Thurn and Taxis was a brewery and that there was a hofbrau on site. (The brewery was sold to Paulaner in 1996, but they continue to brew under the Thurn and Taxis label.)

Thus it was Thurn and Taxis pilsener that introduced me to Thurn and Taxis stamps.

I have attached a scan of a coaster that I picked up there (no T & T collection should be without one) and also a photo of the Bier Post truck that was parked outside. One never knows when or where a new collecting interest might be discovered.


The following note came in from ESU member Pat Parella:

The following is on the bottom of the second page:

History of the 1909 Thurn & Taxis Re-Issues

"The Postal History of Thurn & Taxis was chosen as the featured exhibit by the Regensburg Philatelic Society for the 1909 International Exhibition they were hosting in Bavaria, Germany. The Princely House of Thurn & Taxis had operated a mail delivery service within Europe since the 13th Century, long before most kingdoms, empires and governments had even established their own domestic mail delivery:

"After an exhaustive search by the Regensburg Philatelic Society, a complete 1852-1867 Thurn & Taxis Collection of Sheets could not be found, even from the family archive of the Prince of Thurn & Taxis! It was learned that the original engraved printing plates of these historic issues were included in the sale of the Thurn & Taxis Postal Service to the King of Prussia in 1867.

"The World of Philately owes a huge debt to the Regensburg Philatelic Society for their efforts. This valuable, historic collection containing 32 stamps of the Thurn & Taxis Re-Issues is truly scarce with an estimate printing of 5000 sheets in 1909. After 90 years and two devasting World Wars it is impossible to know how many of these valuable stamps were destroyed - but not many have been recovered."

The Postal History of Thurn & Taxis was chosen as the featured exhibit by the Regensburg Philatelic Society for the 1909 International Exhibition they were hosting in Bavaria, Germany. The Princely House of Thurn & Taxis had operated a mail delivery service within Europe since the 13th Century, long before most kingdoms, empires and governments had even established their own domestic mail delivery!

After an exhaustive search by the Regensburg Philatelic Society, a complete 1952 — 1867 Thurn & Taxis Collection of Sheets could not be found, even from the family archives of the Prince of Thurn & Taxis! It was learned that the original engraved printing plates of these historic issues were included in the sale of the Thurn & Taxis Postal Service to the King of Prussia in 1867. King Wilhelm I of Prussia had since become Emperor of the newly formed German Empire and had entrusted those original

plates to the German Post Office. Permission was granted by the German Government for the Post Office to Re-Issue 33 missing Sheets for the 1909 Philatelic Exhibition provided that each stamp printed would have the initials "ND" imprinted on the reverse and all sheets would be issued without gum. "ND" is the German abbreviation for "neudruck" meaning new impression or new printing.

The World of Philately owes a huge debt to the Regensburg Philatelic Society for their efforts. This valuable, historic collection containing 32 stamps of the Thurn & Taxis Re-Issues is truly scarce with an estimated printing of 5,000 sheets in 1909. After 90 years and two devasting World Wars it is impossible to know how many of these valuable stamps were destroyed — but not many have been recovered.

European City of Science — Hans Snellenberg

Reaching back into the mailbag, I found this email from ESU member Hans Snellenberg. I received it shortly after the last issue of the EN went to the printer. He writes:

Dear Dana.

On 4 April 2022 a special personal stamp was issued to commemorate Leiden, as European City of Science. It depicts William Einthoven, Dutch doctor and physiologist. He received the

European Nobelpris 1924 dillem Einthoven City of Science IEEE Filestone Ieeden2022 Rward 2022

Nobel Prize for Medicine in 1924 as inventor of the string galvanometer, the first practical electrocardiograph, or ECG.

He became a professor at the University of Leiden in 1886.

In cooperation with the designer, Grenzenloos issued a FDC (shown below)

From 2004 and every 2 years thereafter Euro-Science in Strasbourg awards the title of European City of Science to a new European city. The title is awarded as part of Europe's largest biennial multidisciplinary science conference: the **EuroScience Open Forum** (ESOF). For the whole year many different scientific subjects are organised into several seminars, congresses and festivals.

In 2020 Trieste (Italy) was chosen (see Italian stamp to the right, Scott# 3656).



In 2024 Katowice (Poland) will be the host. Katowice is the first city in central and eastern Europe to be given this title.



The Luster Chronicles" continues the 1960 stamp issues with the issue from Sweden.

SWEDEN

Sweden issued a set of two stamps for Europa 1960. The stamps are denominated at 40 Öre and 1 Kr. The D'Urso Catalogue assigned the numbers 94 and 95 to the stamps. The colors of the stamps are described as blue/grey and red.

Technical details from the D'Urso Catalogue indicate that ...the designer of the stamp was Pentti Rahikainen. The engraver was Czeslaw Slania. The stamps were recess printed on un-watermarked paper, perforated $12\frac{1}{2}$, by Postwerkets Frimärkstryckeri, Stockholm in coils of 100 stamps. The production quantity was 5,665,000 for the 40 Öre stamp and 4,039,200 for the 1 Kr stamp.

D'Urso does not list varieties for either stamp in the set.

A first day cancel, from Stockholm is listed. Grenaa-Varberg and Varberg-Grenaa first day cancels are also listed. These are illustrated in the Norway section of this monograph. Maximum cards are also reported for the set.



First Day cancellations were prepared, but little in the way of fancy covers:

SWITZERLAND

Switzerland issued a set of two stamps for Europa 1960. The stamps are denominated at 30 C and 50 C. The D'Urso Catalogue assigned the numbers 96 and 97 to the stamps. The colors of the stamps are described as red and blue.


Technical details from the D'Urso Catalogue indicate that the designer of the stamp was Pentti Rahikainen. Swiss adaptations were done by Hans Thöni. The engraver was Heinrich Heusser. The stamps were recess printed on un-watermarked paper, perforated $11\frac{1}{2} \times 11\frac{1}{2}$, by Wertzeichendruckerei PTT, Bern in sheets of 50 stamps. The production quantity was 20,825,000 for the 30 C stamp and 20,394,200 of the 50 C stamp.

D'Urso does not list varieties for either stamp in the set.

First day cancels are noted from Bern 1, CERN Genève 23 and Nations Unies Genève. The latter two cancels are listed in the D'Urso Catalogue as numbers V-67 and Z-2. Assigned a rarity factors of 3 and 4 respectively. These cancels are illustrated on the next page. Maximum cards are also reported for the set.







V-67/1-2 Although this cancel was in use from 2 January 1947 to 15 August 1965, D'Urso records its use on 19 September 1960. I do not know which or all of the three cancel types was used on the first day





D'Urso cancel V-69 first day cancel from CERN (The European Community for Nuclear Research) with a rarity fact or of 3 and D'Urso cancel Z-2 from the United Nations offices in Genève, with a rarity factor of 4.

TURKEY

Turkey issued a set of two stamps for Europa 1960. The stamps are denominated at 75 Ks and 105 Ks. The D'Urso Catalogue assigned the numbers 98 and 99 to the stamps. The colors of the stamps are described as light olive/azure green and ultramarine/baby blue.

Technical details from the D'Urso Catalogue indicate that the designer of the stamp was Pentti Rahikainen. The stamps were rotogravure printed on un-watermarked paper, perforated $11\frac{1}{2} \times 11$, by Courvoisier S. A., La-Chaux-de Fonds in sheets of 100 stamps. The production quantity was 750,000 complete sets.

D'Urso does not list varieties for either stamp in the set. D'Urso also does not list any first day cancels (although they exist and are illustrated on the next page. Maximum cards are also reported for the set.

STAMPEX 1961

Quoting from the D'Urso Catalogue... "For the occasion of the Stampex Philatelic Exhibition held in London, March 17-26, 1961, the Finnish Postal Administration authorized the issuance of a souvenir sheet. The sheet was printed by the Messrs. De La Rue & Co., Ltd.

The sheet shows the five designs submitted by Finnish designers to the international contest for the choice of the design for the common CEPT 1960 stamp. In the first row are three designs by Olavi Vepsäläinen. In the second row is a design by Mrs. Swen Hammersten-Jannsen, a STAMPEX label and the selected design by Pentti Rahikainen.

The Finnish Postal Administration also authorized the use of a special handstamp. However, it could only be used when a normal 30 MK Finnish CEPT 1960 stamp had been previously affixed over the Pentti Rahikainen design."





This concludes our current installment; of Steve Luster's monograph. He began a similar undertaking for the Europa stamps of 1961. This will be shared in a future edition of Europa News.
